

**BILLINGS COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS  
REGULAR MEETING AUGUST 3, 2021.**

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Michael Kasian at 9:00 A.M. with Commissioners Dean Rodne and Lester Iverson in attendance.

The board reviewed the commission minutes from the July 6, 2021 meeting. Iverson wanted to clear up the confusion with his vote to end the eminent domain for the Little Missouri River Crossing. When Auditor Lamb asked for a roll call vote, he did not intend to vote in favor of stopping the project. States Attorney Weir stated when the vote was taken he would have had to ask commission to change his vote during the meeting. He is entitled to make his explanation and have that recorded in this meetings minutes. Today the minutes can reflect that he intended to vote against the motion. Kasian moved to approve the minutes as presented. Rodne seconded. All voted aye.

Chairman Kasian asked for any additions or changes to the agenda. Rodne would like to add discussion regarding recordings to the agenda. Kasian moved to approve the amended agenda for the meeting. Iverson seconded. All voted aye.

Southwestern District Health Unit Director Sherry Adams was present to give annual updates. They cover the 8 southwestern counties, where they offer emergency preparedness, vaccine clinics, public health nurses to the counties, etc... Primarily, the last year and half they have been receiving Covid-19 funding to provide the communities with increased testing. With Covid funding, they were able to hire five additional staff. They are having trouble finding a nurse for Golden Valley/Billings County. Right now, Tara is the nurse on and will continue to stay on until they find someone who will be here full time. Kasian asked if there was a lot of turn over with staff and finding nurses. Nurses, Medical Providers, and EMS staff are losing up to 50% workforce due to overworking due to Covid. Mental health strain is taking a toll on medical staff. Rodne and Iverson will attend the budget meeting at Southwestern District Health Unit office August 24, 2021 at 6:30 pm.

The board moved to the agenda topic regarding concerned citizens for the Little Missouri River Crossing. A number of residents were in attendance. One resident requested the board make a motion to rescind the vote to stop the bridge. He stated that a bridge could have helped the firefighters during the fires up north at the Short property and others. He questioned the chairman as to why he voted for so many years in favor of the bridge. He stated that people who live in the county want the bridge and that Federal Highway decided the spot and the county has congressional support for it. Another resident asked why they made the offer to the Shorts in April when residents were in attendance at the meeting and then vote not to move forward when they weren't there. Kasian stated there was a lot of dollars involved and he didn't want to dig county in debt. The resident asked why Kasian didn't have the figures on the grants and county funds, he also asked who the bridge benefitted. Kasian stated it would benefit the county. The resident noted it would benefit emergency management, fire fighters, and allow for surface material from across the river to district 2. Would save 220K in fuel costs, congressional and legislative support. If dot picked a location, there would be state dollars. 80/20. Another resident stated that the cost for the bridge doesn't reconcile with the small population. A different resident stated that it is for more than just oil field traffic. A resident stated that a bridge crossing has been discussed for 40 years and they are just kicking the can down the road. A resident stated that the board was elected to represent the residents of the county and that the public is in favor of the bridge. It was brought up that there has been eminent domain in the county before and they need to do what is in the best interest of the county. A potential survey of county residents was discussed. A question was posed whether they would rescind their previous motion. Commissioner Iverson stated that he intends to make a motion to rescind at the next meeting and that he is giving notice to the other commissioners of that decision. Rodne stated that there needs to be something done up north and south. He felt 60 acres was too much as well as the cost of the bridge. He would like to explore other options and get a vote of the public. Kasian stated the county will still look for a place but he wants to purchase on a friendly basis. Other discussion was had regarding where the individuals who were there were representing. The response was farmers, ranchers and fire fighters and three individuals requested that this topic be on the agenda. Sheriff Rummel asked why the county can't just put bridge on federal land. States Attorney Weir stated that the county cannot condemn federal land. A resident asked whether the board was willing to negotiate any further with the Short family. Kasian and Rodne said no, Iverson said yes.

Tax & Zoning Director Stacey Swanson presented one pipeline application that was approved with conditions by the Road Superintendent & Weed Officer.

- Medora Grazing Association – boring under Mikes Creek Road. Extend application for an additional year. Work will begin in the next few weeks.

Iverson moved to approve the application. Rodne seconded. All voted aye.

Jess Karls from KLJ and Jeremy Wood from Northern Plains Engineering gave their reports along with Road Superintendent Jeff Iverson. 121<sup>st</sup> project is looking good. It is a 2.5-mile stretch. Project is going well with Hlebechuk Construction. It is mostly graded out and waiting for box culvert to be delivered. Iverson met with a landowner on easements on Wannagan Creek– will meet with Chris Erickson to negotiate the easements. Crews hauling in all three districts. Met with Roughrider Electric and Consolidated on the Internet project. 30<sup>th</sup> street will be complete by the end of the week. Highlands Engineering met with Jeff to look at a few of the culverts needing replacement. They are raising the culverts up higher than before. Cattleguards on 18<sup>th</sup> Street were cleaned. MPLX will turn over to us, looking into fair market value for rock to use for riprap. Discussed the sign that Bill Palanuk came to request from the commission. The county will start out with two intersection signs that light up, they will be around \$1,000 each. Can get a traffic count on the roads if needed, Jeff usually does it on roads where he wants to do safety improvements. Stormwater prevention plan went well. Knife river will be coming back to the Krehlik pit around Labor Day. Met with a landowner to discuss a temporary fence to graze his cattle until the crushers come. Met with Misty Hayes from the forest service to discuss moving the Maah Daah Hey crossing for safety concerns on East River Road. Located before Amerada CTB and South of Lavelles. A lot of traffic and people parked there unloading horses. We will not have to adjust the speed limit. When applying for FLAP, they solicit bids and then the feds take care of the process. Southwest Water Authority authorized the county to resell water to ranchers as needed for the next 90 days. Another issue brought forward is talking with the DOT on Highway 10 rumble strips, there were none located where the recent accident took place wherein an individual lost her life. Located between 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> street. We will wait for accident reconstruction prior to responding to Terry Traynor with Association of Counties and vision zero. Pipe on Kurt Cordons will get cleaned out, plenty of room for drainage.

Ken Vein, Amy McCann, Jenn Jackson, and Linda Pancratz were present from the Theodore Roosevelt Presidential Library Foundation to introduce themselves. Linda is the board chair for the presidential library and started out by introducing herself and giving some background on who is on the board. It consists of 10 members ,5 are from North Dakota, Victoria Chambers, Eileen Sheel, Robby Lauf, Melanie Wolter, 2 retired Rod Backman and Sagsveen. Ed O’Keefe is the CEO. Ken Vein is out of Grand Forks, Amy McCann is in Medora, Tony Erickson out of Bismarck and Josh Swains out of Bismarck. Eight of the twelve full time staff are located in North Dakota, JLG Architecture Jen Jackson. Most who are involved have roots in ND and are very passionate regarding this project. States Attorney Weir suggested that they look at the Billings County land use plan. It is their intention to be aligned with the customs and cultures of Billings County. Would like to address any questions and concerns that the commission has regarding some of the ideas. They would also like to personally take the commissioners out to the site where the library will be built. They want to respect the land and the people and the culture. Site ecology that includes wastewater and stormwater reuse. On site energy generation solar and geothermal. Batteries for storage of energy. Minimal impact and disruption to the butte. Jen mentioned the use of materials that are close to the site. Viewshed management that includes night sky preservation that will not disturb neighbors, downward direction lights and headlight shields. Current concept is the building is a landform and the grass will go over the building. Working with Swanson and Weir to get to the details of the materials that will be included. Having Amy located directly in Medora has been a great asset. The main library office is right across from the post office. This is a place where tourists and locals can come in to gather information. There have been a few events to provide information and to do meet and greets and they will continue to have these. Have had regular meetings for almost a year with the Medora Grazing Association, Emergency Services and Zoning, along with States Attorney Pat Weir for legal representation. Development agreement will be brought forward later. Working with emergency services to discuss the plans of repairing the current musical road or to add an emergency egress access road. They will look for fed and state funding. Iverson stated that they have a lot of interest from people outside of the county, but many of the county residents who live here full time are not in favor of the library. How will they get more information out to county residents to get them more in favor? There is also some disagreement with how they acquired the land for the library. The county may want some help in acquiring federal land to place a bridge north. There will be a community breakfast next Monday, 8:30am – 10am. Need to have some smaller group discussions. Amy would like to look into going up to Fairfield to hold a meeting for county residents. This project will put a heavy burden on the county for emergency services so they will need to work closely with the community and the county. They are working on an agreement that reflects the cooperative philosophy that they will adopt with the county.

Misty Hayes was present from the US Forest Service to discuss FLAP projects that include Bullion Butte and Whitetail Crossing. The forest service provided letters of support for those projects. They just recently hired a new law enforcement officer, Bobby Henderson, who will need to go to law enforcement training. Appreciate all the support for the fires from Billings County. They have been working with the Billings County Weed Board. Fire restrictions are in place, no campfires, no shooting, and no smoking. Kasian asked how many acres have

been burned. Approximately 12,000 acres. Several other small fires. Limited grazing on the fire spots as soon as they can. Pat asked Misty with senate bill 2377 wildfire reduction act, section 8001 mandates closure. The forest service does not have a motor vehicle use map in the Dakota Prairie Grasslands. All of the areas are closed as it stands now, except for permitted and authorized roads. Two track trails are included in permitted roads. They would like to put together a county roads jurisdiction. They have not started any process under NEPA to do the travel management plan. If they close a road that a rancher uses, they would consider all of those pieces as part of grazing agreements, there can be exceptions. Sheriff Rummel stated that Billings County is responsible for fire and law enforcement but they want to call the congressional delegation. Sheriff's office feels that their concerns voiced receive no response. There were hundreds of people here to race the Maah Daah Hey Trail and the county was not notified of the permits for those races. There is another race coming up this weekend with the extreme temperatures and it will put a large burden on our services. Our fire department is taxed so rules will need to be followed by county orders meaning there will be no fires in this county. The bike races are getting bigger and bigger every year. Misty stated they recognize the needs. Several counties had different restrictions. They do tell the campers etc that they have to be in the know regarding the local restrictions etc. They can potentially have people out and about to assist. The forest service is not opposed to a river crossing. She felt there were additional opportunities for a different area. There hasn't been anything designated to release the 93 acres that they are selling to the library. They will then identify the lands that could be purchased. States Attorney Weir asked how much land the forest service gave and she stated it was 50 acres short for the one for one. They found that they can no longer use the authority through the small tracts act and the sale was possible due to congressional action. The county could potentially utilize the NEPA that has been done and use forest service land. We can look at other alternatives. Rodne stated that the forest service is doing an environmental review for the presidential library and he would like to engage in more discussion with the forest service and road & bridge to look at a potential place for a river crossing.

The board recessed for lunch at 12:10pm.

Board reconvened at 1:10pm.

The commission was presented with the grievance letter sent in by a terminated employee of the county. The board asked Road Superintendent Iverson about the decision that was made and he stated that he still supports termination for the reasons documented. The board reviewed the documentation and the policies that are set in place in Billings County. Commissioner Iverson moved to uphold the decision of the Road Superintendent. Rodne Seconded. All voted aye.

States Attorney Weir gave his report. He updated the board regarding his review of the Elkhorn gravel pit and his legal opinion regarding that as well as the settlement agreement with the Short family for them to dismiss the federal lawsuit. Kasian moved to approve the settlement agreement. Rodne seconded. Rodne and Kasian voted aye. Iverson voted nay. Chairman Kasian signed the agreement.

After review of the preliminary Road & Bridge budget, Rodne moved to approve. Iverson seconded. All voted aye.

After the board reviewed the preliminary general fund budget, Iverson moved to approve. Rodne seconded. Roll call vote was taken with Iverson, Rodne and Kasian voting aye.

A Total Burn Ban resolution was presented. Kasian moved to approve the total burn ban. Rodne seconded. All voted aye. The resolution reads as follows:

RESOLUTION NO. 2021- 17

TOTAL BURN BAN - BILLINGS COUNTY, ND

August 3, 2021

WHEREAS, the Billings County Board of Commissioners recognized that abnormally dry or drought conditions combined with high winds and almost daily fire responses within Billings County; and

WHEREAS, all available resources remain committed to protecting life and property; and

WHEREAS, the impact of fires threatens the health, well-being, and safety of citizens in Billings county; and

WHEREAS, the cost of response and the inordinate equipment wear may be far in excess of available County resources; and

WHEREAS, the Daily Fire Danger Index does not realistically reflect the propensity for wildland fires; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Billings County Board of Commissioners declares a Total Burn Ban on open burning in Billings County {regardless of fire danger categories assigned per the North Dakota Fire Danger Rating Map) effectively immediately until further notice. The only allowed exceptions are the responsible use of gas grills used at a safe distance from combustible materials. This ban will be reviewed periodically as conditions improve.

THE PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS BURN BAN IS A CLASS B MISDEMEANOR (NDCC 37-17.0-10.1: MAXIMUM SENTENCE OF 30 DAYS IN JAIL AND \$1,500 FINE, AND RESTITUTION OF FIRE SUPPRESSION COSTS MAY BE SOUGHT FROM THE COURT).

What is banned?

- Garbage burning, campfires, burning of farm or crop land, unnecessary off-road motorized travel, ignition of fireworks, and outdoor smoking.
- No travel is to be allowed off of surfaced roadways normally used for vehicle traffic except as necessary for normal farmer/rancher or industry operations. Industrial operating crews and farmer/rancher operations shall have fire extinguishers and normal fire-fighting equipment at hand, and industrial personnel shall remain at the job site one-half hour after daily operations are completed

Discussion was had regarding how long to keep recordings of the commission meetings. It was a consensus of the commission to keep the recordings for 6 months.

Sheriff Rummel gave his report. There has been a significant increase in calls in the last two months. We had a local overweight fine of \$6,800. The commissioners agreed that with the calls and the man power they need, to let the sheriff's office hire another deputy. Iverson moved to approve an additional deputy. Rodne Seconded. All voted aye.

Maintenance Supervisor Travis Bertelsen gave his monthly report. Johnson and Johnson gave him a quote for the new fire alarm panel at \$5,791.00. Nova said they would have to replace everything so would be more expensive. Nardini hasn't returned his call. Central Mechanical has pushed back the start date to August 15<sup>th</sup> now. They are still waiting on equipment to show up. Window project is pushed back to September 2<sup>nd</sup>. Museum will be getting the outside done early this fall. The dump on the south side is staying clean.

Commissioner Iverson updated the board on a meeting that was held with the Department of Health regarding ambulance services. He will work with the Auditor, States Attorney and EMS and present a plan moving forward.
